Welcome to Woodlands County "Naturally Economic"

Woodlands County is a rural municipality approximately 150 kilometers northwest of Edmonton, Alberta. Comprising an area of 7,669 square kilometers, Woodlands County is larger than Prince Edward Island!

The county surrounds the Town of Whitecourt, and includes the hamlets of Blue Ridge, Goose Lake and Fort Assiniboine. Whitecourt is the primary trading area for over 50,000 people.

Woodlands County offers a unique blend of urban and rural lifestyles, active and collaborating business relationships, and a focus on recreation and family activities.

Key regional advantages include:

- Central location between the urban centers of Edmonton and Grande Prairie and the Duvernay Shale Formation;
- Excellent transportation system via road, rail, and air;
- Dynamic and thriving economy;
- Young and productive workforce;
- Growing professional development and training opportunities;
- Established telecommunication infrastructure.
- Expanding health services;
- Available and affordable land;
- Affordable housing and living;
- Modern recreational facilities;
- Countless outdoor and indoor leisure opportunities;

Three major rivers flow through the County – the McLeod River and Athabasca River meet at Whitecourt. The Woodland Cree Nation called the area Sagitawah – *the place where rivers meet*. The Athabasca River feeds most of the industry in the area. The Freeman River meets the Athabasca River at Fort Assiniboine and is the water system for the unincorporated community.

Rich History

During the Hudson's Bay era, Fort Assiniboine became a transportation centre and supply point for goods carried by pack horse from Fort Edmonton to Lesser Slave Lake post, Jasper House and Dunvegan after George Simpson had a trail cut from Fort Edmonton to Fort Assiniboine.

This trail continued to be used up to the 1870s, and was revived in 1897 to 98 during the Klondike Gold Rush as part of the Chalmers Trail, cut to assist travellers trying to reach the Klondike gold fields through Canada. The now famous **Klondike Trail** as promoted as an "all-Canadian route to the easy gold of the Yukon."



The Klondike Ferry is one of the last running ferries in Alberta.

Economic Indicators

Woodland County's economic drivers are oil & gas, forestry and value-added manufacturing, agriculture, and aggregate extraction.



Oil and Gas

The area is a regional hub for the oilfield industry and home to many service companies that specialize in providing services to the energy sector. Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) is emerging in the region.

Nearby are two major oil plays. The Montney is rich in gas and associated liquids such as condensate. The Kayob-Duvernay, is an emerging oil and liquids-rich gas formation in the Western Canada Sedimentary Basin. The Duvernay is liquids rich, and the condensate it produces can be used as a diluent to help get the bitumen to market; it is relatively close to Canadian oil sands (bitumen) production.



Forestry

Woodlands County and Whitecourt support a successful, innovative and very integrated forestry industry. Three major facilities are located in the region: Millar Western Forest Product produces pulp and dimensional lumber; Blue Ridge Lumber produces multi-density fibre (MDF) and dimensional lumber products; Alberta Newsprint is the province's first and only newsprint and paper manufacturing facility.

The industry supports a wide variety of forest industry service providers, including contractors for reforestation, harvesting, and hauling services.



Agriculture

Agriculture is prevalent both in the northeast portion of the County around Fort Assiniboine and in the rolling hills to the south of Whitecourt. Soils are generally rated class 3 and 4. Canola is a high yielding crop in the area.

Cattle ranching is another major agriculture activity in the County.



Mineral Extraction

Woodlands County is recognized for its large gravel and aggregate deposits. The County has created bylaws for future gravel and aggregate developments to accommodate other rich aggregate deposits in the area.

The Silver Creek Windfall Gravel Pit, operated by Standard General, is a state-of-the-art facility and transports approximately 9,000 tonnes of product per day to the Edmonton area by rail.

The County also has a growing tourism and bio-energy sector which is related to the integrated forestry industry.



Preliminary geothermal potential mapping has determined that sites in Woodlands County have demonstrated suitable temperatures and basic geological factors to support further investigation into direct use opportunities and power generation.



Alternative Energy

The Whitecourt Power plant provides a consistent level of power, similar to coal or gas, but it uses renewable resources and has a carbon neutral footprint. It was the first power generating facility in Canada to be certified under the federal government's EcoLogo program.

The wood waste biomass comes from Millar Western, Blue Ridge Lumber, Alberta Newsprint Company and other smaller mills in the area. It is part of a strongly integrated forestry industry in the region.

Millar Western has also brought on a new bioenergy plant at its Whitecourt pulp mill. Anaerobic hybrid digesters (AHD) are integrated into the existing aerobic effluent treatment system. AHD units recover organic material from the effluent stream and convert it to a biogas. After conditioning, the biogas will be used to fuel reciprocating engines, to generate 5.2 MW of electricity for use in the pulp operations.

Tourism / Outdoor Recreation

Two major travel corridors plus the boreal forest setting, scenic rivers, lakes, and top notch recreational facilities provide a full suite of year round outdoor activities. Snowmobiling, hunting, ice-fishing, nordiq skiing, snowshoeing, downhill skiing, and snowboarding are popular activities.

Warmer season activities include camping, fishing, hiking, boating, tubing along the McLeod River, horseback riding, ATVing, and much more.

Privately run tourism providers include: Groat Creek Outfitters, Upstream Drift Company, Horse Creek Ranch, and the Woodlands RV Park & River Marina – a one-of-a-kind riverboat marina that provides river tours.

Canamex Corridor

The Corridor includes approximately 1,150 km of Alberta's provincial highway network, including parts of Highways 4, 3, 2, 216, 16, and 43, linking the Alberta/ Montana border crossing to the Alberta - British Columbia border on Highway 43. Highway 43 forms the northernmost portion of the CANAMEX Corridor and is the start of **The Alaska Highway**.

Grizzly Trail

Alberta Provincial Highway 33 is commonly referred to as the Grizzly Trail. It follows the original **Klondike Trail**, which was advertised by Edmonton merchants as the shortest route to the Yukon during the Klondike Gold Rush.



Labour Force by Occupation



Successful Partnership



Blue Ridge Berry Nice Spray Park	New spray park with 13 splash-ready water features. Playground and skateboard park are located nearby
Blue Ridge Recreation Area	Trail system for walking or cycling in summer and cross-country skiing and snowshoeing in the winter. Beach with designated swimming area, picnic tables and portable restrooms. Lake stocked with trout.
Eagle River Staging Area	Nestled in the lush forest along Highway 32 North toward Swan Hills, the site functions as a snowmobile staging area in the winter which leads to an assortment of trails and a group camping area, during the summer. Includes a sheltered cook house, cook stove available for facility renters, and fire pit.
Golden Triangle Trail System	Golden Triangle Trail contains 350 kilometres of award-winning snow-mobile trails that connect the communities of Whitecourt, Fox Creek and Swan Hills. The trails are maintained by local clubs.
McLeod River Tubing	Tubing is a popular activity on the McLeod River, which is a gentle flowing river with subtle and light rapids. Designated pickup and drop-off areas for 5.5km of floating.
Timeu OHV Recreation Area	The facility provides a variety of challenges for ATV enthusiasts - composed of sandhills and intermittent wetlands over a 38-kilometre square area – near Fort Assiniboine.
Westward Equestrian Centre	A 100' X 200' arena with a riding area of 90' x 180'. Owned by the Whitecourt District Agricultural Society. Westward Riders Horse Club uses arena.
Whiteridge MX Park	A new motocross track located outside Blue Ridge. The facility was built for racing quads and motocross bikes and consists of 20 obstacles over a 2-kilometre track.

Carson-Pegasus Provincial Park	Close to 200 lakeside, RV, and tent-only sites, with trees offering privacy, with a playground and beach close by. Other activities include: hiking along well-marked trails, fishing for fresh trout in McLeod Lake, and swimming. Motor boats, rowboats, canoes, paddle boats and kayaks are also available for rent
Eagle River Casino and Travel Plaza	Located on the corner of highway 43 and 32 north in the Whitecourt area on the on the Alexis Nakota Sioux First Nation, the Travel Plaza has parking for up to 50 semitrucks. The Casino has 25,000 square feet of gaming space and features 250 gaming machines and eighteen table and poker games. On-site restaurant.
E. S. Huestis Demonstration Forest	A 10-square km forest area that shows how a forest can sustain recreation, wildlife habitat and resource harvesting. Includes a 7 km trail with interpretive signs.
Forest Interpretive Centre	Whitecourt's Visitor Information Centre is operated out of the Forest Interpretive Centre. The Gallery shares the importance of the forest and forest industry in the development of the region.
Fort Assiniboine Museum	Constructed in the classic Hudson's Bay-style of a trading post and reflects the furtrading times. Fort Assiniboine, which is the second-oldest fort in Alberta.
Freeman River RV Park	Located along Highway 33, a privately owned and managed RV Park adjacent to the Freeman River offers fishing, golfing and river activities.
Goose Lake Campground	Run by Goose Lake Recreation Association, the campground is a quiet, mature spruce campground with private sites, group camping, kid's playgrounds, a mini golf course, walking path and boat launch.
Groat Creek Recreation Area and Group Campground	Located alongside the beautiful Groat Creek, the site functions as a snowmobile staging area in the winter months and a group campground during the summer. Includes a new cook shelter with a woodstove and power via generator hook-up, group fire pit, wood shed and out house facilities.
Hard Luck Canyon	A unique geological feature carved by Hard Luck Creek through the sandstone layers of the Paskapoo Formation - ancient cliffs. Trails and picnic area.
Klondike Ferry Park	Situated next to one of the last running ferries in Alberta, the Klondike Ferry. This campground provides access to this historical landmark. Campsites and various hiking and biking trails are available.
Schuman Lake	Located 24 km west of Fort Assiniboine on Secondary Highway 658, Schuman Lake is clean, calm and is stocked annually with Rainbow Trout. Only non-fuel water crafts are allowed on the lake.
World's Largest Wagon Wheel and Pick Axe	Great photo opportunity. Giant wagon wheel and pick axe are a reflection of Fort Assiniboine's rich cultural history, as the hamlet was a major trade and supply point during the Hudson's Bay era and was also an important location during the Klondike Gold Rush in the 1800s. Located beside Fort Assiniboine Museum.
Meteorite Impact Crater	This a bowl-shaped depression formed by the explosive impact of a meteoroid hitting the surface at a high velocity is the youngest and best preserved meteorite impact structure in Alberta.
